Gretel Acosta is a Ph.D. Candidate and Instructor at Tulane University. Her academic endeavors center on Latin-American and Latinx contemporary literature and visual arts, encompassing research, curatorial work, and writing. Currently, her doctoral research delves into the influence of literature's growing integration within contemporary art, as well as the portrayals of contemporary art themes in Latin American and Latinx narrative fiction.

Nancy Denisse Durán (Ph.D. California, Riverside) is Associate Professor of Spanish at Danville Area Community College. Her research centers on how contemporary Latin American authors present a revisionist writing of fairy tales with a focus on women's representation in literature. Currently, she is interested in issues related to fantasy and the appropriation of fairy tale tropes in Mexican and Colombian narrative.

Maripaz García (Ph.D. Texas at Austin) is a Spanish Senior Lector at Yale University. Her most recent line of research includes the cultural benefits and challenges of Virtual Exchange in the foreign language class to enhance students' language skills and intercultural communicative competence.

Leslie Maxwell Kaiura (Ph.D. Virginia) is Associate Professor of Spanish at the University of Alabama in Huntsville.
